



## **“Making Research Count” Translating Latino Research Into Policy Fellows Training Program**

### **Eligibility Criteria**

- A. Academic Candidates with a **research focus on the Latino/Hispanic Population**
  - Higher Education Faculty (Adjunct included)
  - Graduate and Doctoral Level Student
  
- B. Non-Profit Organization Candidates with a **research focus on the Latino/Hispanic Population**
  - Organizations include those that are Service Based or
  - Policy Research and Advocacy Focused
  
- C. Research Discipline
  - a. Health, Education, Economics, Sociology, Public Affairs, Political Science, Criminal Justice, etc. **with a focus on the Latino/Hispanic Population**
  
- D. Professional Interest and Work - Health and Human Services, Education, Labor/Employment, Housing, Economic Development, Immigration, Civic Engagement, etc. **with a focus on the Latino/Hispanic Population**
  
- E. Submit an application that includes:
  - a. a statement (50 words max) of interest in the Latino Policy Research Fellows Training
  - b. a Policy Abstract (250 words max)
  
- F. Policy Abstract Guide
  - Focus on a single issue
  - Focus on state and/or local level policy need
  - Impacts low to middle-income Latinos

- Data and analysis supported
- Policy recommendation will target an identifiable Latino *bienestar* relevant issue or concern

G. Attendance and Work Requirements

- Attend the training in full
- Bring a laptop to the training
- Agree to pre and post-training assignments
  - Pre Assignments
    - Send bio & headshot
    - Expand your policy abstract into a 1-2 page policy brief (template will be provided)
  - Post Assignments
    - Agree to incorporate your policy brief into a ‘Policy Brief Book’ that will be widely distributed by LTPC
    - Complete a debrief call and/or post training survey with the LTPC Faculty Team
    - Agree to be part of a collaborative Latino research support network
